Famous Neighbours

Ardoch not only has had famous occupants but famous neighbours. Former Prime Minister Alfred Deakin is buried next door in the St Kilda cemetery.

Deakin was elected to Federal parliament in 1901 and became Attorney General in Prime Minister Barton's first cabinet. He was Prime Minister in 1903, for three years from 1905, and for two years from 1909.

His parliamentary career began in 1879 when he stood as a Liberal candidate and narrowly won the Victorian seat of West Bourke. In his maiden speech, he stunned the parliament by announcing he would resign due to allegations over the fairness of the poll. He was elected again the next year, and was very involved in irrigation and water supply issues.

In the decade leading up to the turn of the century, Deakin was preoccupied with the Federation movement. He attended many intercolonial conferences and Federal conventions and was involved in the development of the Constitution.


Who's Who

Ardoch History

After the first subdivision of the Ardoch site in 1857 (22 years after Melbourne's founding), the first building appeared in 1864 – at presently the eastern section of 1 Ardoch Ave, the home of William Wardell, then Inspector-General of Public Works in Victoria. Wardell, later Sir William Wardell, was responsible for the building of Government House, Parliament House, the Elizabeth St Post Office, St Patrick's Cathedral, and many

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other well-known buildings.

With the collapse of the Colonial economy in the 1890s, St Kilda witnessed an exodus of wealthier residents to the eastern suburbs and many mansions converted to boarding houses. Following World War I, St Kilda became a popular location for lat development, especially areas close to public transport.

About 1922, more buildings were erected around the open space at Ardoch, the Village Green, a concept popular in the UK in the late 19th century.

By 1928, the last of the original buildings appeared- no e and no 3 Ardoch Avenue, which were classic examples of the improved style of 'Californian Bungalow' complete with a maid's room. Dame Nellie Melba rented part of no 2.

It's interesting to note that the boom in flat building after World War II was accompanied by the common notion that 'flat dwelling was somehow contradictory to the morals of family life'! Ardoch did in fact provide residential accommodation for the American High Command during World War II, and no 1 Ardoch Ave swerved US officers as a high-class brothel. The Russian

After the war years, like so many St Kilda flats, Ardoch entered a long phase of social and physical decline until the later 1970s when the Education Department acquired it for use as a unique full scale secondary college in a domestic setting providing a supportive based for homeless and disadvantaged children.

In the early 1990s, the site was purchased by developers, who, in conjunction with the Urban Land Council, built four new buildings. The Body Corporate was formed in 1996.

Among Ardoch's many residents of note (as registered in the now defunct Sands & McDougalls Directory), were Dame Nellie Melba, painter Emmanuel Phillips Fox, famous tenor John Brownlee, whose international career was launched at Covent Garden, and Gladys Moncrieff.

The brief social history of Ardoch outlined here reinforces the character of Ardoch as a singular and unique enclave, both in its architectural conception and its cultural niche in Melbourne's society since 1864.

Ardoch Living

Marge's Foolproof Biscuits

Beat 2 egg whites till thick and mix in a cup of icing sugar.

In a separate basin, mix together:

- 2 cups cornflakes
- 1 cup choc-bits
- 1 cup shredded coconut.

Add this mixture to the beaten egg whites and sugar and mix. Drop in teaspoonfuls onto a greased tray and bake at 175° till lightly browned about 10-12 mins. Allow to cool slightly before removing with a flat knife.
